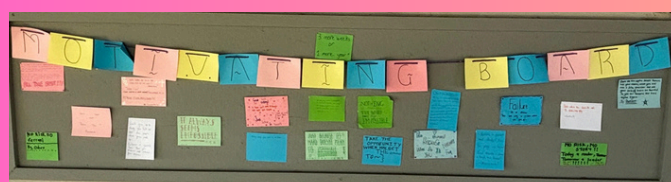

3. Lesedi Mothamaha, Monthathi Motshoane and Rofuna Mashaba – Dance (Gold)

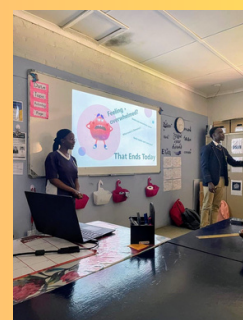
